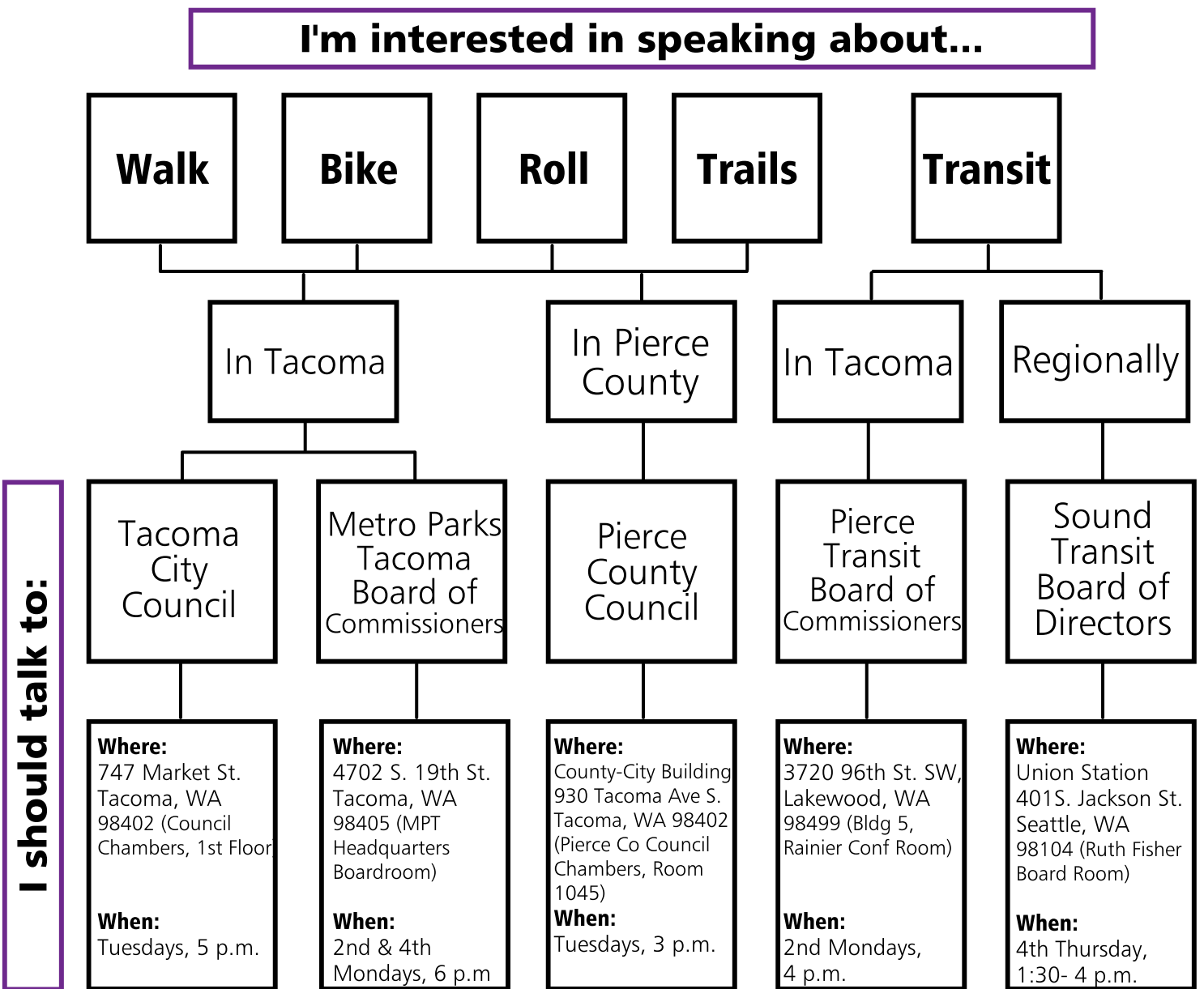


How to Speak Up for Walking, Biking, Rolling, & Transit

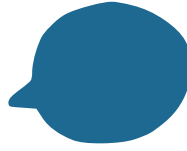

Rolling can refer to using a mobility aid like a wheelchair, or to traveling using a skateboard or scooter.



When writing a letter to or speaking before Council or Commissioners:

1. Establish Credibility: I live/work here and I take the bus/ride my bike/walk
2. Show gratitude: Thank you for your time/for implementing /adopting measures/supporting ____
3. Share Concern(s): I would like you to continue to support ___/collaborate with ___/consider ____

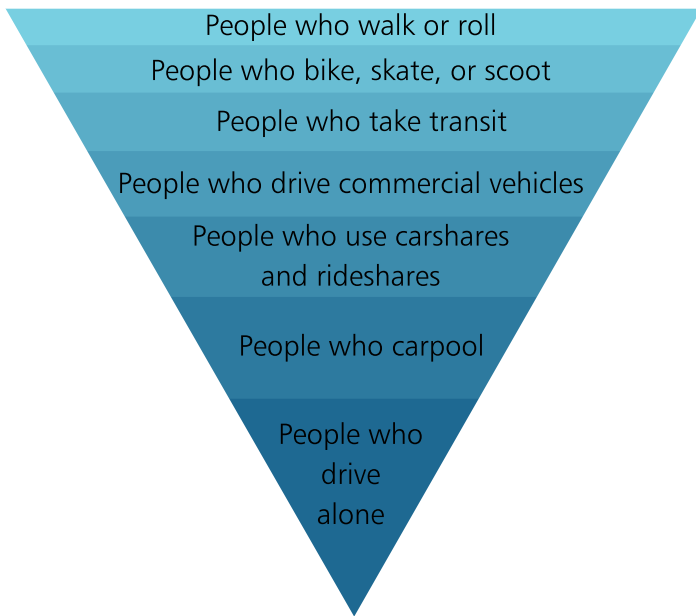

- Reinforce a compact, urban core

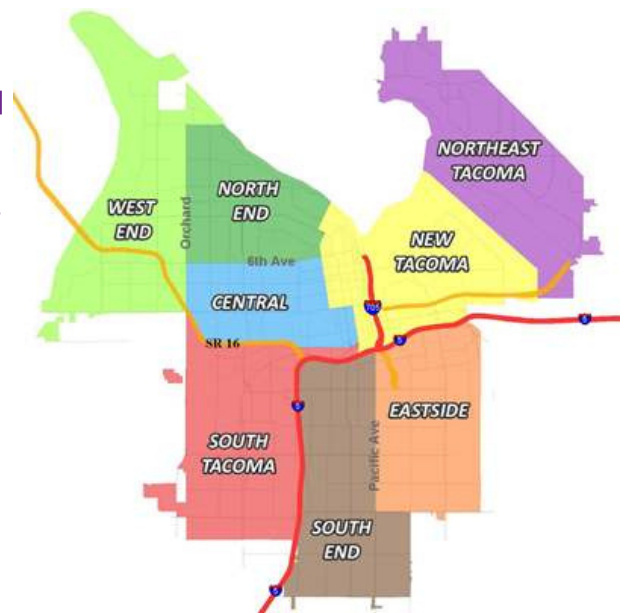
Get involved in your Tacoma Neighborhood Council:
